Go to Market



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RAIN after train of trim Pacific Fruit Express reefers are rolling to Roseville to begin their long run during which every car will cover an average of 6,000 miles before again being hooked behind a fruit tramp for another "spot." That is California's grape crop going to market.

Last season during the September peak 1800 cars of grapes rolled daily E. equipment thousands of foreign reefers are deadheaded to California to do the job.

This annual movement has grown in ten years from 16,358 cars. But this spectacular increase in shipments has unfortunately been accompanied by unwelcome price declines which

have reduced the farm value of grapes from \$348.00 to \$76.00 per acre leaving the producer small profits, if any, for his labor.

A year ago grape growers organized themselves into the California Vineyardists' Association and now over 12,000 are participating, under the leadership of Donald D. Conn, in a program to bring about better marketing of their product and to increase their returns to profitable levels. Trade promotion is one of the many features of this service organization, and this year a determined effort will be made to obtain a greater share of the consumer's dollar by advertising the slogan "Eat California Grapes-Keep Well" during National Grape Week, September 23-29.

Hotels, restaurants, and dining cars are being urged to serve California grapes regularly and dealers will be given every possible aid in the program of stimulating consumer desire for the product. California growers will back up their campaign with high quality fruit at prices within the reach of everyone to the end that eastern folks may enjoy better grapes oftener and, having once partaken of this leading California fruit, will eagerly await its arrival each season during the years to come.
